Main Road Projects This Summer

Road and sewer/water conditions are two of the highest priorities for Northglenn residents. This summer, the city will be utilizing American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funds to cover the cost of two projects to improve the condition of Northglenn's infrastructure.



The application period ran April 4 to 22.

Huron Waterline

The water main running along Huron Street between 104th Avenue and Fred Drive has experienced multiple breaks over the years. This project will replace approximately one mile of water main, 3,900 tons of asphalt, 2,000 linear feet of concrete, 123 linear feet of storm sewer, 48 valves, and four hydrants.

The cost for the waterline replacement is \$3.5 million. Work will start later this summer.



ARPA Streets

This project will mill and overlay the following sections of road:

- East 104th Avenue from Washington Street to Interstate 25
- Westbound lanes of East 104th Ave. from Irma Drive to the city limit
- County Road 11 from East 168th Avenue to N Metro Avenue (near the Wastewater Treatment Plant in Weld

The cost for this street work is just over \$1 million. As of May 24, construction was set to start May 31 and run into July.

Combined, the two projects will cost \$4.5 million and ARPA funds will pay for all of it.

Traffic will be affected by construction, but a lane will be open in both directions at all times.

Force Main A, a new major sewer line, is mostly installed. The pipe runs along the east side of the city. The only work left is to connect the line with the pipe to the Wastewater Treatment Plant, which should happen this summer. > For more details, go to www.northglenn.org/ forcemainaproject.



• So Far, What Achievement, Action or Work Are You Most Proud of During Your Tenure on Council? 

Summer Safety Keeps Summer Fun

Summer is here! As the school year comes to a close, schedules change and we have longer days to enjoy outside. Summer is too short to miss due to a safety mishap that could have been avoided.



Water Safety

One frequent summer emergency is calls to swimming pools, rivers and lakes. Risk of drowning is the primary concern, yet slips and falls are an issue as well. Small children need appropriate floatation devices when participating in water activities, youth should know basic water safety and swim skills, and adults should take care near water (especially if your celebration includes adult beverages!). Bike and pedestrian safety is a year-round concern in Northglenn. Drivers need to be extra careful, slow down, and watch for kids playing in neighborhood streets or on bicycles. Teach children safety precautions for crossing streets whether on foot, bike or scooter. Wear helmets! Wear seat belts!

Planning is underway for the city's 4th of July event!

This year, so long as there are no fire restrictions, city is planning to provide a profes-

sional fireworks display as done in the past. We encourage you to mark your calendars and plan on a fun-filled day at E.B. Rains Jr. Memorial Park.

The Police Department continues to enforce fireworks laws. We recognize that this is a subject that has many conflicting viewpoints – we have residents who feel there should be no limits, others who feel Northglenn should enforce as strictly as possible, and various positions in between.

Our current local law specifies a mandatory minimum fine of \$1,000 for the first offense and it increases for repeat offenses. If you are caught with fireworks, setting them off, or they are set off on your property, you could be cited. Any fireworks that leave the ground or explode are illegal.

In 2021, the Police Department responded to 229 fireworks calls for service and issued 96 fireworks summons. Illegal use of fireworks not only upsets neighbors, vets and pets, they cause many injuries and fires.

Please be aware – if you are reporting

illegal use of fireworks, police need an address. Also, when officers respond there must be evidence of fireworks use in order to take any action. The best way to report is via www.northglenn. $org/accessnorthglenn\ or\ 303.288.1535.$

Water Use Reduction Requested

City in Stage 1 Drought

Despite a late May snowstorm, an unusually arid April combined with already parched conditions has left the entire state designated as at least abnormally dry, according to the NOAA. With Northglenn currently in Stage 1 Drought status, the city has been reducing its water use by 10% and looking at other ways to conserve water throughout its infrastructure.

Here are some ways you can help inside and out:

Outdoors:

- Utilize the Slow the Flow program. Residents can have a free evaluation of their automatic sprinkler system. Go to www.resourcecentral. org/sprinklers or call 303.999.3820 to sign up or for more details.
- Check for leaks in hoses, faucets and sprinkler systems.
- Set your lawnmower to a taller height.
- Don't hose off driveways and sidewalks use a broom instead.
- Don't "water" your concrete.
- Update your landscape with less grass and more water-wise plants.
- Install a rain sensor for your sprinkler system.
- Replace high-use sprinkler heads with water-efficient models.

Indoors:

- Run your washing machine or dishwasher only when you have a full load.
- Turn off the water when you brush your teeth or wash your face. This can save 4 to 10 gallons of water each day.
- Install a low-flow showerhead.

They strive to provide diagnosis, treatment, and recovery care close to their patients' homes

"It's nice to be working in this area where I live because it feels like I have something in common with my patients," said nurse Tara Grant. "I know the pharmacies they go to. I know their primary care doctors' names. I understand their lifestyle in this area."

The SCL Heart and Vascular Institute provides a network of heart specialists. They treat conditions including atrial fibrillation, heart disease, high cholesterol, and more with specialists in areas such as nuclear imaging and echocardiography.

During the pandemic, they sought out creative measures to continue treating their patients. In addition to seeing them in person, the institute added telehealth visits and created ways to send in blood pressure logs and

► Adams County Awards \$35M in Total Grants By Way of ARPA

Adams County

The Adams County Board of Commissioners approved a resolution awarding \$35 million in grants to local organizations, nonprofits, school districts, fire districts, and businesses on April 26.

The funding for the grants was provided by the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA).

Twelve Northglenn businesses and nonprofits received funding in the Economic Stimulus and Recovery, Family Stability, and Health and Wellness categories for a total of \$1,346,323. (See table, right.)

The county received more than 200 applications totaling more than \$163 million in requests. A total of 102 grant applications were funded, representing 70 entities, with 13 organizations receiving two or more grants. Grants range from \$1,000 to \$1.8 million. The grants must be used for COVID-19 response and recovery efforts in the






