

City Manager's Column: A Letter from Heather Geyer

Resident Feedback **Determines City Services**



At its core, the City of Northglenn exists to provide services to residents. I sometimes get asked the question, directly and indirectly, who decides what services are provided? And at

what level? The simple answer: the residents of Northglenn. You.

The city is governed by the mayor and members of City Council who are elected by you, the residents. City Council listens to resident concerns and needs through multiple channels, advocates for services or service changes, and ultimately approves an annual budget that provides the funding necessary to provide services.

As a service-driven organization, staff is our greatest asset. My role as city manager is to ensure the council's desired level of service is aligned with staffing and provide the tools for services such as materials, space, equipment and training.

The City of Northglenn provides many essential public services - public safety, sanitation, water, sewer, transportation, parks, recreation, and so much more.

The city is in a strong and stable financial position, and as a result, City Council has been able to consider new requests and expanded services. In the past, when budgets were tight, requests could not be considered. Therefore, level of service can change over time based on available funding.

The city is governed by the mayor and members of City Council who are elected by you, the residents. City Council listens to resident concerns and needs through multiple channels, advocates for services or service changes, and ultimately approves an annual budget that provides the funding necessary to provide services.

Trash service is a good example - once upon a time city leaders had a vision to provide residential trash service and identified a funding structure to support that vision. Today, our trash and recycling services provide a good value relative to the private market, and our customer service far surpasses what a private vendor can offer. Residents would pay more for their trash if the city did not offer this service.

In 2022, we are responding to a desired increase in level of service. This is visible in the 2022 Budget that was adopted by City Council on Oct. 25.

2022 is just around the corner and we have an exciting year ahead! As a quick reminder, this month we are conducting our biennial resident survey and I look forward to hearing how you think we have been responding to Northglenn input and needs. ► See the cover for more on the survey.

- Next-level, data-driven policing with a dedicated full-time crime analyst position

- Addition of parks maintenance workers to address concerns about quality and frequency of parks upkeep



Properly Stored Guns Save Lives

► Reimbursement Up to \$525 Available From City for Gun Safe Purchases

Over the past 18 months our community, as well as the entire nation, went through something never seen before — a pandemic that changed the way we live our lives. We

spent more time at home than ever before.

During this period, the Ralston House Child Advocacy Center was involved in six cases of children under the age of 18 unintentionally shooting another child. In five cases, the child gained access to their parents' loaded weapons in their own home. Tragically, four children died from these shootings. These specific cases occurred in Adams and Broomfield counties, but thankfully, none were in Northglenn. Executive Director Don Moseley with Ralston House indicated, "...the parents believed they had secured the guns and/or the children would know better than to play with the guns."

In these cases, there are multiple victims

– the child who was shot, the child
who lives with the guilt of accidentally
shooting a sibling or friend, the gun
owners, extended family and friends.

– Don Moseley Executive Director, Ralston House Child Advocacy Center As your police chief, I urge gun owners to securely store all firearms kept in your home. This includes locking up firearms, and preferably locking up the ammunition separately. To help make this possible, the City of Northglenn offers a Gun Safe Reimbursement Program, which reimburses Northglenn residents up to 30 percent of the cost or a maximum of \$525. Go online to www. northglenn.org/gunsafe for details.

In addition, talk to your children about firearms and the potential danger. It is an important conversation, even if you do not own a gun. Knowing the danger as well as your rules about firearms will help keep them safe in case they ever end up in a situation where firearms are present.

COVID-19 UPDATE

BOOSTER DOSES ARE NOW RECOMMENDED FOR CERTAIN PEOPLE.

You **SHOULD** get a booster if:

- You are 65 years old or older.
- You live in a long-term care facility.
- You are 50 to 64 years old, at high risk of severe COVID-19.
- You are 18 to 64 years old and at high risk because of where you live or work.
- You received the Johnson & Johnson vaccine for your first dose.

If you got Pfizer or Moderna for your first two doses, you should get a booster approximately six months or more after your second dose. If you got Johnson & Johnson for your first dose, you should get a booster approximately two months or more after your initial dose.

You can get any type of vaccine for your booster dose. It doesn't have to be the same type as the doses you already received.

Free Vaccines Available

- Anyone 12 and older can get a free COVID-19 vaccine at a pharmacy, doctor's office, pop-up or local clinic, or mobile vaccine bus near you. No ID or insurance needed. Most providers take walk-ins and same-day appointments. You are entitled to paid time off from your job to get vaccinated and recover from any side effects.
- Northglenn residents may call the Northglenn Senior Center at 303.450.8801 to find a vaccine.
- Another way to find a vaccine clinic is by calling the state's vaccine hotline at 877-CO VAX CO (877.268.2926). The hotline is available Monday through Friday, 8 a.m. to 8 p.m.; and Saturday and Sunday, 9 a.m. to 6 p.m.
- You can also schedule a vaccine appointment by calling the Tri-County Health Department at 303.220.9200. Their nurses are currently administering adult and child routine vaccines, COVID-19 vaccine, and the flu shot.
- The Westminster Office, 1401 W. 122nd Ave. #200, offers walk-ins and appointments are available every week on Tuesdays and Thursdays from 8:30 to 11:30 a.m., and 1 to 3:30 p.m. and on Fridays from 8:30 to 11:30 a.m. Youth ages 12 to 17 require a parent/legal guardian consent.

Community Test Sites Open

It's easy to get a free, fast, and safe COVID-19 test. Pre-registration speeds up the process, but is not required. No insurance or ID needed. Help Available Through Home Repair Program

► Eligibility Based on Household Income

Funding is available through the Adams County Minor Home Repair Program to help homeowners in need with repairs to their houses. The program will assist low to moderate-income residents in Northglenn with fixes deemed necessary for the health and safety of those residing in the home.

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Due to COVID-19 restrictions, interior repairs are currently limited to failed water heaters and HVAC units, as well as urgent accessibility upgrades. Exterior work will remain the same and includes repairs and/or replacements of roofs, water heaters, HVACs, windows, doors, accessibility improvements, and other minor repairs to ensure decent, safe, and sanitary housing. Eligibility for the program is based on yearly income of the household.

DRIVING ALONG

The map to the right shows the progress for the Force Main A replacement project.

This major sewer line replacement stretches from East 105th Place and Irma Drive to 124th Avenue and Claude Court. Construction is expected to last until Januarv.

The majority of the work is now complete. Crews are now focused on a stretch along Leroy Drive in the Northglenn Industrial Park, and then on the far north edge on Eastlake Avenue/ East 124th Avenue.

Please continue to watch for door hangers notifying you of any work in your area. Sometimes there are minor interruptions to water/sewer services, but notifications will go out at least 48 hours in advance. Remember work is always weather dependent.

Saturday through November from 8 a.m. to 3 p.m. But starting in December, it will only be open on the first Saturday of the month through March.

Located at the south end of the Maintenance & Operations Facility, 12301 Claude Court, just go through the gate as you enter the parking lot.

Only people who live in Northglenn single-family residences can drop off debris, so you need to have proof of residency, such as a driver's license or utility bill with a photo ID.

Much of the yard waste is then

turned into mulch - which is available to anyone, including commercial businesses. However, you must bring your own shovels, as the city does not provide tools to use.

NO TRASH PICKUP ON THANKSGIVING

The city will NOT pick up trash on Thanksgiving - Thursday, Nov. 25.

If your trash is normally collected on Thursday by the city, it will instead be taken away on Friday, Nov. 26.

Households that have Friday pickup will still have their garbage and recyclables collected on Friday, Nov. 26. Trash and recycling carts should normally be out

on the curb by 7 a.m. on pickup day, but on Nov. 26 it is especially important.

The trash and recycling schedule for Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday of that week will not be affected.

NEW TRASH CARTS, LIDS AVAILABLE

After a steady diet of weather, being filled with garbage and then getting picked up and put back, even trash carts start to break down. What if my trash cart needs to be repaired or replaced?

Trash carts are the private property of the resident, but they have a manufacturer's warranty for 10 years against the wear and tear

from trash truck equipment. Lids have a 12-year warranty.

If carts are outside the warranty period, new lids may be purchased for some models. Otherwise, new carts are always available for purchase. Call 303.450.4004 to find out if carts are still under warranty and to make arrangements for a new cart or lid.

ake Care of Your Trees Before, During V

Colorado State Forest Service

As temperatures drop, trees in urban and community settings across Colorado go dormant, and they require care before and during the winter to remain in top health. Residents can take measures now and through spring to help their trees, said Dana Coelho, Urban and Community Forestry Program Manager for the Colorado State Forest Service (CSFS).

The CSFS offers the following tips to prepare Colorado's urban trees for winter:

• Wrap the trunk. Thin-barked trees like honeylocust, maple and linden are susceptible to sunscald and frost cracks because of drastic winter temperature fluctuations. To prevent bark damage,

wrap the trunks of younger trees up to the first branches using commercial tree wrap. Leave the wrap on until early

Mulch the base. Apply 2 to 4 inches of wood chips, bark or other organic mulch near the base of the tree, but not against it, to reduce soil evaporation, improve water absorption and insulate against temperature extremes. The city's Yard Waste Mulching Center offers free mulch to everyone. ► See story, above.

Give them a good drink. Water trees in the area extending from the trunk to the longest branches, known as the drip line. Water slowly, at a rate of 10 gallons per inch of tree diameter. Ample moisture in the ground at the onset of winter sets trees up for success to start growing in spring. Watering conifers is especially important since they keep their leaves all year long and lose more moisture over the winter.

Focus on younger trees. With less

extensive root systems, they require the most care.

- Wait to prune until winter. Late winter is the best time for pruning most tree species, but it can be done whenever trees are dormant over winter. Common reasons for pruning are to remove dead branches and improve a tree's form. Always prune just outside the branch collar (the point where a branch joins a larger one) and don't remove any branches without good reason.
- Water during extended dry periods (e.g., more than two weeks without snow cover), per the guidelines above. The best time for winter watering is warmer days, when snow has melted and the temperature is above 40 degrees.

Snow Removal A Priority for City

Street Clearing Starts When 4 Inches Accumulate

Street Snow Removal Routes In cases of minor snowfalls (less than 4 inches) the city will plow, sand and salt primary and secondary routes as well as hazardous stops, hills, schools and emergency facilities. For storms greater than 4 inches or if there's the possibility of road closures, the focus will stay on primary and emergency facilities. Secondary and residential streets will be addressed as soon as possible. **Primary Routes:** All arterials and major collector streets that serve high-traffic routes and access to emergency service vehicles • Examples: 104th Avenue, 120th Avenue, Huron Street and Washington Street

Secondary Routes: Collector streets and select residential streets that provide access to emergency stations, schools and bus routes • Examples: Claude Court, Irma Drive and Melody Drive

Residential Areas: Priority is given to stretches that have dangerous hills, curves or intersections.

When it starts snowing, the city begins clearing the over 37 miles of public sidewalks and paths in the Greenway Trail System.

A priority system is in place so the most-used paths, trails and sidewalks are addressed first. These are usually near businesses, government offices, high-density residential areas, schools and school bus pickup areas.

The next priority is paths that are connectors to the city's Greenway Trail System or lead to regional trail systems. The last priority is internal loops in city parks.

The city aims to have all paths cleared 24 hours after the snow has ended, but weather can cause delays. Patience with our snow removal efforts is appreciated.

Thanks for clearing snow and ice from your sidewalk within 48 hours after the weather clears – it makes your neighborhood much safer!

You might assume the best thing to do with snow on a sidewalk is to throw it in the gutter – then it can travel down into the storm drains.

However, the better move is to put the snow onto your lawn – especially next to your trees. That way, they can benefit from the extra water during the normally dry winter.

Snow put in the street or gutter can

cause slick roads and ice dams. If you see an ice dam building in the street please break it up.





Funds in Place for **New Facility**

The first phase of the Civic Center Master Plan - the new Northglenn Recreation Center, Senior Center and Theatre – is complete. Now the city has begun shifting to the second phase - a new city hall facility.

The new City Hall aspires to:

- Be an inspiring civic resource for residents
- Serve as a gathering place and anchor of the Civic Center
- Foster a sense of pride, camaraderie and community

The plan is for the new City Hall to be placed off Community Center Drive next to the Northglenn Veterans Memorial, where the old rec center parking lot is now.

The current City Hall is nearly 40 years old, and lacks the resources, safety infrastructure and proper space for employees to efficiently provide services to the community.

The cost for the new City Hall is estimated at \$18 million - and the city already has the money to pay for it. No

new taxes will be necessary. The funds were generated by the $\frac{1}{2}\%$ sales tax and the 4%Special Marijuana Tax, both of which can only be used for capital projects.

The Northglenn Urban Renewal Authority bonded \$11.21 million to construct the public infrastructure on the Civic Center project. Part of that investment will be used for the City Hall project.

When complete, the Civic Center will be a new heart of the city, providing civic, cultural and economic amenities to residents.




