Betty grace Gibson and her family were one of the first homeowners in what would become Northglenn, and she worked as a secretary at Malley Drive Elementary School for 23 years.

Outside work, one of her passions was art. In 1961, she saw an ad in the local newspaper for people who wanted to paint together. Betty and five other women jumped at the chance — out of this group was born the Paletteers Art Club. It's still active and she was a member until her death in 2021 at 95 years old.





simple - we want to take Northglenn's value of community policing to the next level by inviting stakeholders to be more involved in how police services are provided in our city.







- Community Center Drive –
- The road is being repaved from Malley Drive up to the Webster Lake Promenade. The project may force the narrowing of the road down to one lane, although it should be done by the end of December.
- Huron Waterline project The one mile of waterline has nearly been replaced underneath Huron Street from 104th

Avenue to the south city limit. This requires that Huron Street traffic is limited to one lane in each direction and occasionally side streets connecting to Huron Street are closed off. Depending on weather, the waterline should be fully replaced in 2022, with paving likely coming in the spring.






