Department Earns National Accreditation

The Public Works Department recently received full accreditation from the American Public Works Association (APWA) for the first time.

This accreditation formally verifies and recognizes that the agency is in full compliance with the recommended management practices set forth in APWA's Public Works Management Practices Manual.

Northglenn is the ninth agency in Colorado to achieve accreditation.

"It is a tremendous accomplishment to have accreditation, this honor certifies

what we have built over the last four years. This kind of thing doesn't happen without the managers and staff that put in the work and effort every day," said Public Works Director Kent Kisselman.

This voluntary process has taken over two years and required intense evaluation of 561 specific areas – everything from the department's procedures to communication to culture. This has led to improved operating procedures, more efficiency and increased preparedness in case of an emergency.

The purpose of accreditation is to promote excellence in the operation and

management of a public works agency, its programs and employees.

Open to all governmental agencies with responsibilities for public works functions, initial accreditation from APWA is for a four-year period, during which time semi-annual updates will be required to demonstrate continuing compliance. After that, there is a re-accreditation process that builds on the original accreditation, encouraging continuous improvement and compliance with newly-identified practices.



A quick roundup of roadwork activities in your city.

 Progress continues as planned on the 120th Avenue **Improvements Project.** Crews are simultaneously working on lighting, curbs, stormwater infrastructure and the street itself. Motorists and pedestrians may notice some dark patches, as lighting is being removed and installed on both sides of the street.

Work on New City Hall Leading to Parking Adjustments



Exciting things are happening on the Civic Center Campus!

New City Hall Construction

Phase 2 of the Civic Center Master Plan

is coming to life with the construction of the new City Hall.

Construction partner FCI has been busy working on site preparations. This includes demolition of existing sidewalk, removal of trees and parking lot asphalt. The construction area is visible through the fencing on the east side of the existing City Hall. The 32,600-square-foot new City Hall will be nestled into the hillside south of Memorial Parkway. The City plans to break ground on the construction of this new facility on June 5.

Please know that there will be construction activity in this area through the fall of 2024. While we don't have an exact move-in date, we hope to be in the new facility by the fall of 2024/winter 2025.

Plan Ahead for Parking

With so much going on in such a small area, invariably parking is going to be affected. A map of the construction area and parking options is available at www.northglenn.org/newcityhall.

We will push out updates on any changes to parking via social media and in the Connection.

• Between June 2023 and November



This red area of this map is the footprint for the new City Hall. You can see the current facility to the east and the rec center in the background. Crews have started preparing the ground ahead of the official groundbreaking on June 5.

2023, parking on the south side of Memorial Parkway will be fenced off. Construction fencing will shift south and those parking spaces will be available later this year.

- Between December 2023 and October 2024, the south entrance to City Hall will not be accessible. The public can still enter through main entrance of City Hall, via Memorial
- · All city facilities will be open as usual during construction.
- Parking will be available in the old Northglenn Recreation Center lot during construction. The only exception is during Food Truck Carnival, May 19 through 21. For large city events, I recommend parking at the Wagon Road Park N Ride, located on Huron Street and 120th Avenue. Additional lighting and police presence will be provided at night to support use of the tunnel under Interstate 25 during our special events.
- · Visitors are flocking to the new

Northglenn Recreation Center, Senior Center and Theatre! This means that depending on the day, time and what programming is happening at the facility, please plan extra time to find parking.

A Couple Quick Updates

- Repaving between 120th Avenue and Malley Drive will start May 1.
- The current City Hall main entrance parking lot will be repaved May 8. The area needs a little extra TLC beyond just patching potholes. The repaving will be done in a financially responsible manner so it can hold up for 18 to 24 months.
- Old Recreation Center Building -Staff is working on plans to demolish the building in the fall of 2024. The facility will remain fenced off until that time. The city is required to complete environmental remediation on the site and the building, which is why the demolition has been delayed.

STREET SWEEPING MAP

The map shows areas labeled 1-7. Each area requires two days to complete. Your address determines your sweeping day.

If your address ends in 1, 3, 5, 7 or 9, you are on the odd schedule. If the number of your address ends with 0, 2, 4, 6 or 8, you are on the even schedule.

 The first date is the odd-numbered side of the street.

· The second date is the even-numbered side of the street.

You must keep the sweeping side of the street clear from 7 a.m. to 4 p.m. for both days of the cycle. You may still drive on the street, but not park.

This process will continue throughout the schedule.


