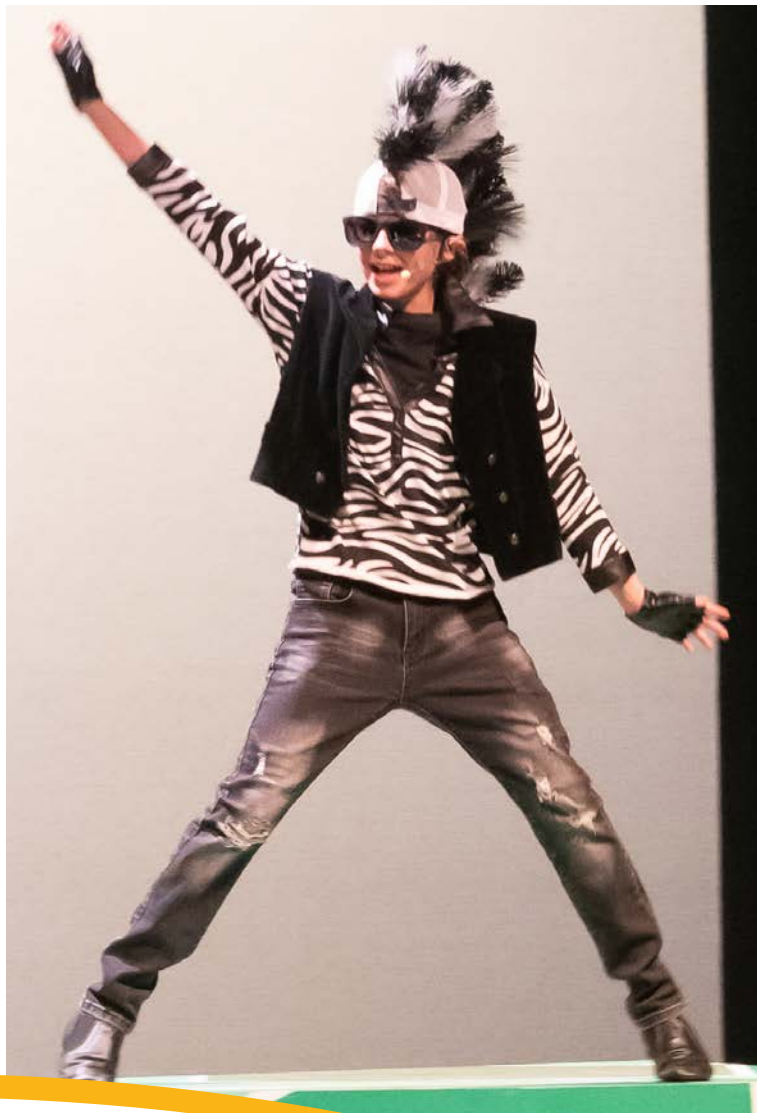

Three's Company

► East 120th Ave. Widening From Two to Three Lanes With Driver, Pedestrian Upgrades Done Early

After months of hard work, the 120th Ave. Improvements Project is complete. Residents and visitors now benefit as congestion and commute times are greatly reduced, with the stretch from Sylvia Drive to the N Line now three lanes in both directions instead of two.

The project also included stormwater improvements for the roadway and its surrounding areas, a new traffic signal at Race Street, and walking paths on both sides of the street.

“Whether driving, biking or walking, our residents and visitors will instantly recognize the improvements in this area,” said Mayor Pro Tem Shannon Lukeman-Hiromasa. “We’d like to thank everyone involved in making this project

become a reality, and we sincerely appreciate the public’s patience with construction.”

The planning began in 2021 and was funded by the Denver Regional Council of Governments (DRCOG) through the Transportation Improvement Program and administered by the Colorado Department of Transportation. The federal grants amounted to \$9.48

million and required a 20% match, which was paid by the city and partners — Karl’s Farm Development and the City of Thornton.

American West Construction was awarded the project in April of 2022 and began in January. Despite historic rain levels in 2023, the project was completed ahead of schedule.

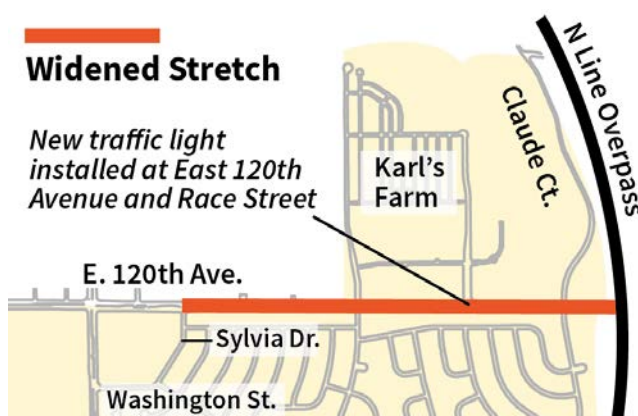

COUNCIL TAKES STAND AGAINST HAMAS ATTACK, ANTI-SEMITISM

On Oct. 23, City Council unanimously passed a resolution *Supporting Israel and Condemning the War Launched by the Hamas Terrorist Organization*. In addition, a proclamation *Condemning Antisemitism and All Forms of Hate* was read into the record.

An excerpt from the proclamation:

... an informed and unified community is the best defense against hate. We believe in the fundamental dignity of every human life, and this is a reminder to all listening that the City of Northglenn does not support any form of antisemitism or hateful behavior.

End of the resolution:

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF NORTHGLEN, COLORADO, THAT:

Section 1. The City hereby expresses its support for the State of Israel, and condemns the unprovoked and unjustified war launched by Hamas terrorists against Israel.

Section 2. The City Council further directs the City Clerk to transmit a copy of this Resolution to the members of the State of Colorado's congressional delegation.

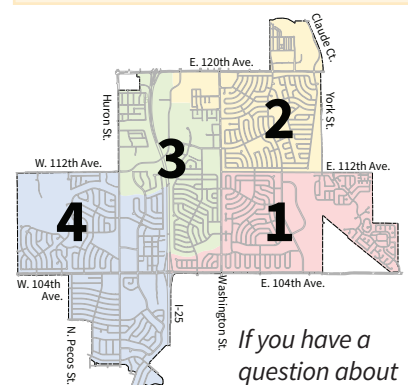

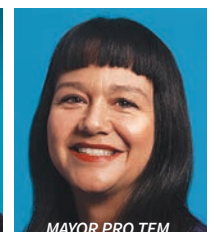

City Manager's Column: A Letter from Heather Geyer

Get Help Through Access Northglenn

► Best Way to Reach Out for City Assistance

On any given day, I could get a dozen or more requests, complaints and concerns. These could include a graffiti report, pothole complaint or a question about the budget.

Even though I am the city manager, and am more than willing to forward the request to the appropriate staff, contacting me directly is not the most efficient way to get a response from the city.

What is? Access Northglenn. This is an app for your smartphone or available online at www.northglenn.org/accessnorthglenn. Find the topic you want to contact us about and fill out the form. Immediately, the city

staff person best able to address your concern will receive an email about the submission. (Hey – it might be me!)

Depending on the inquiry, a staff member could reply with questions, a response to your issue, or a thank you for the report to let you know the situation has been fixed. And don't worry about getting lost in the shuffle – staff receive reminder emails if a submission hasn't been closed out and city leadership has oversight for the items that go to their staff.

If that's not enough to convince you to use Access Northglenn – how about this? I regularly encourage City Council members to submit their

issues to Access Northglenn, and to have their constituents do the same.

What could you report issues about? Well, in addition to what I mentioned at the top of this column, other top requests include abandoned vehicles, park conditions and trash services – like curbside recycling! (You can also send in a thank you if you're so inclined. We like to share them in the citywide staff report.)

NOTE: Two reasons you should NOT use Access Northglenn are for an emergency or crime in progress. Please, dial 911 immediately!

I need to hear from residents and visitors – both the good and bad about what's going on in Northglenn. But what I love is to serve – and resolve concerns to the best of our ability. To have your concerns relating to your city government addressed, I would say unequivocally to start with Access Northglenn.

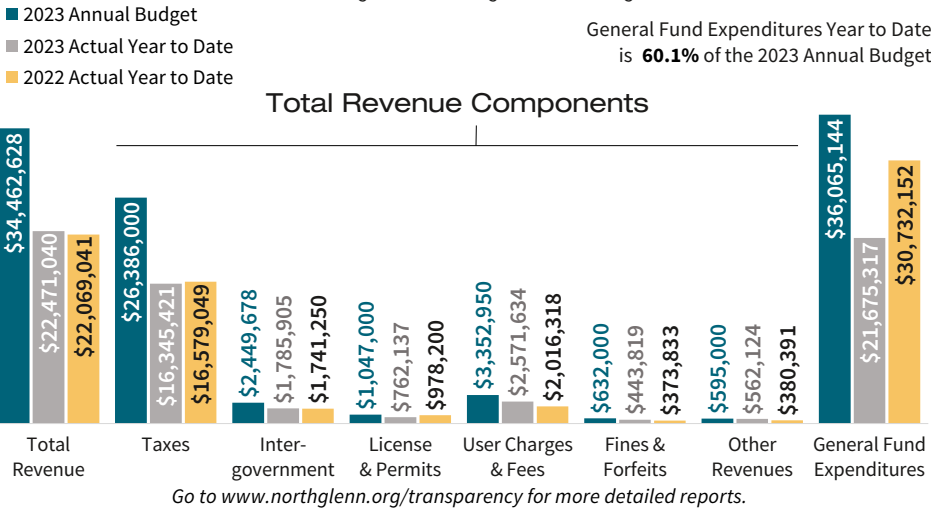

August 2023 General Fund Financial Report

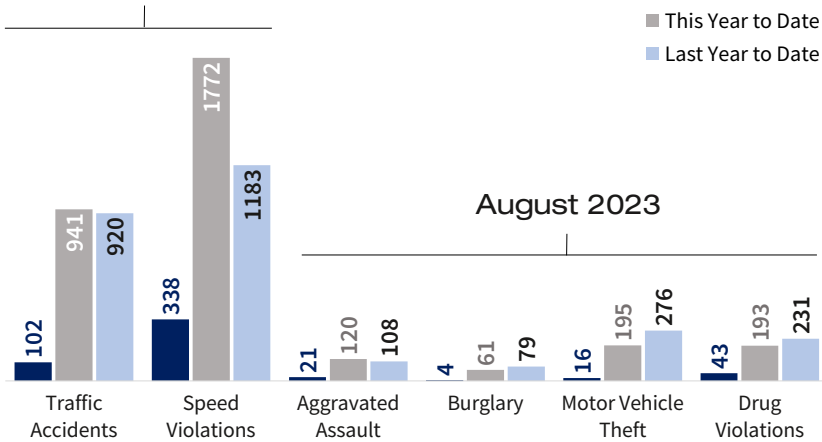

Mayor's Memo: A Message from Mayor Meredith Leighty

On Oct. 18, I had the honor of welcoming U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) Regional Administrator KC Becker and others during a media event highlighting community-led air quality monitoring projects in Adams and Jefferson counties, funded in part by the EPA.

Why did they choose here to do the media event? Because we have had two air quality monitors, one near City Hall and one in Northwest Open Space, since May 2022.

I had the opportunity to talk about our Love My Air partnership with the Adams County Health Department, as well as several other sustainability efforts in our community.

In 2019, we made sustainability one of our strategic plan focus areas, and our efforts have more than lived up to the challenge! Here are a few examples in addition to the Love My Air program:

- New city buildings are more energy-efficient and solar-ready. We have solar panels at the new rec center, and our new City Hall is a "net zero building," meaning it will be energy-saving and generate as much power through renewable sources as the building uses. ▶ Check out an update on the new City Hall on Page 8.

- We installed public level 2 Electric Vehicle (EV) charging stations at the Maintenance & Operations Facility, Jaycee Park, and the new recreation center. This makes charging more accessible in our community and alleviates range anxiety.

- The city is working to implement the EV Readiness Plan that was created through the Partners in Energy Program with Xcel. We are striving to make the plan inclusive, sustainable, cost-effective, and innovative. In fact, I have an EV and worked with Xcel to install a charging station in my home.

- We completed a Fleet Electrification Advisory Program (FEAP) that helps us to determine which vehicles we can and should transition to EVs within the city fleet.
- The city is participating in the regional Solar Switch program with Solar United Neighbors (SUN). This provides an easier way for residents to learn about and implement solar energy.

I am proud of all the green efforts we are making in Northglenn – it makes a difference now and for future generations. We plan to continue to work with regional partners to make cleaner air a reality in our community, state and country. ▶ Check out our local air quality at <https://clean.lovemyair.com>.

Don't Hibernate on Your Trees This Winter

► Dry Weather, Temp Changes Take Their Toll

Colder months are ahead and freezing temperatures can occur quickly in the fall.

As temperatures drop, trees in urban and community settings across Colorado go dormant, and they require care before and during the winter to remain in top health.

Residents can take measures now and through spring to help their trees through the oncoming harsh conditions, said Dana Coelho, Urban and Community Forestry Program Manager for the Colorado State Forest Service (CSFS).

The CSFS offers the following tips to prepare Colorado's urban trees for winter:

- **Mulch the base.** Apply 2 to 4 inches of wood chips, bark or other organic mulch



near the base of the tree, but not against it, to reduce soil evaporation, improve water absorption and insulate against temperature extremes.



- **Give them a good drink.** Before storing the garden hose for winter, water trees in the area extending from the trunk to the extent of the longest branches, known as the drip line (the point on the ground where water will drip off the widest-reaching branch).

Water slowly, with a sprinkler or soaker hose, at a rate of 10 gallons per inch of tree diameter. Ample moisture

in the ground at the onset of winter sets trees up for success to start growing in spring. Watering conifers is especially important since they keep their leaves all year long and lose more moisture over the winter.

- **Wrap the trunk.** In Colorado, thin-barked trees like honeylocust, maple and linden are susceptible to sunscald and frost cracks because of drastic winter temperature fluctuations. To prevent bark damage, wrap the trunks of younger trees up to the first branches using commercial tree wrap. Be sure to remove the wrap in early April.



- **Recycle leaves.** Instead of disposing of autumn leaves, consider layering them around the base of each tree

as mulch, or blend them into the yard with a mulching mower to retain nutrients.

- **Focus on younger trees.** With less extensive root systems, they require the most care.



- **Wait to prune until winter.** Late winter is the best time for pruning most tree species, but it can be done whenever trees are dormant over the winter. Common reasons for pruning are to remove dead branches and improve a tree's form. Always prune just outside the branch collar (the point where a branch joins a larger one) and don't remove branches without good reason.

Coelho said planted trees often require additional, regular

watering over the winter. During extended dry periods (e.g., more than two weeks without snow cover), provide supplemental water per the guidelines above. The best time for winter watering is on warmer days, when snow has melted on the ground and the temperature is above 40.

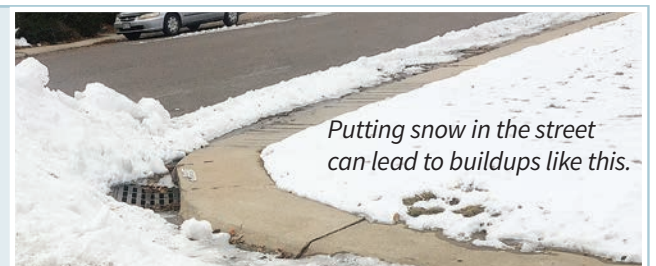
SHOVEL SNOW ONTO THE LAWN, NOT THE GUTTER

You might assume the best thing to do with snow on a sidewalk is to throw it in the gutter – then it can travel down into the storm drains.

However, it is better to put the snow onto your lawn – especially next to your trees. That way, they can

benefit from the extra water during the normally dry winter.

Snow put in the street or gutter can cause slick roads and ice dams. If you see an ice dam building in the street, please break it up.

2024 GENERAL ELECTION

Council, City Measures Up For Vote

▶ Ballots Due by 7 p.m. on Nov. 7 to be Counted

At the Nov. 7, 2023 election, Northglenn voters will elect a mayor, one council member in wards 1 and 2, and two council members in wards 3 and 4 – one to serve a four-year term and one to serve a two-year term. (See candidates below.)

Residents will also vote on two ballot measures. One asks voters whether the language in the city’s charter should be amended to be gender-silent by using position titles such as mayor, council members and police officers. The other asks whether the ½% sales tax should be extended indefinitely to support public safety,

residential streets and parks. (See ballot questions below, right.)

School district candidates, special district questions, and state ballot measures will also be on the ballot.

Ballots Already Mailed
Ballots for the Nov. 7 election were mailed to registered voters by the Adams County Election Department beginning Oct. 16. If you haven’t received your ballot, call the Adams County Election Department at 720.523.6500 or visit a Voter Service and Polling Center location.

Register to Vote In Person
If you need to register to vote, you can do so at an Adams County Voter Service and Polling Center. (See breakout box for locations.) Eligible residents can register to vote up to and on Election Day.

Language Assistance Available
The language assistance hotline is available to voters

for the Nov. 7 election by calling the Secretary of State’s Office at 303.860.6970. Please have your ballot with you when you reach out for assistance. Voters can also request translation services through the Adams County Election Department at 720.523.6500 or at a Voter Service and Polling Center.

Ballots Due by 7 p.m. Nov. 7; Postmarks Don’t Count
Voted ballots must be returned by 7 p.m. on Nov. 7 to be counted. Postmarks do not count. After Oct. 30, the Election Department recommends that voters return their voted ballot in a 24-Hour Drop Box or to a Voter Service and Polling Center to ensure ballots are received in time.

Voters may also drop off their ballot at an Adams County Voter Service and Polling Center or a 24-hour drop box by 7 p.m. on Nov. 7. (See above right for location locations.)

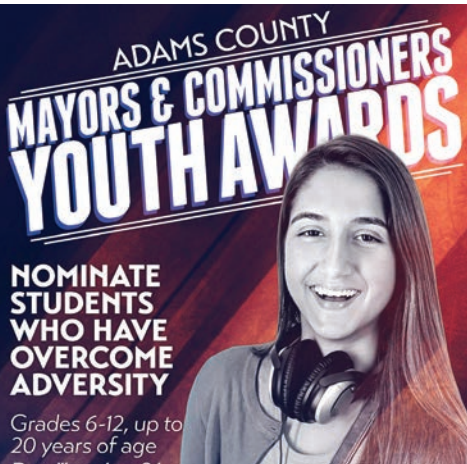

Path & Sidewalk Snow Removal Routes

When it starts snowing, the city begins clearing the over 37 miles of public sidewalks and paths in the Greenway Trail System.

A priority system is in place so the most-used paths, trails and sidewalks are addressed first. These are usually near businesses, government offices, high-density residential areas, schools and school bus pickup areas.

The next priority is paths that are connectors to the city’s Greenway Trail System or lead to regional trail systems. The last priority is internal loops in city parks.

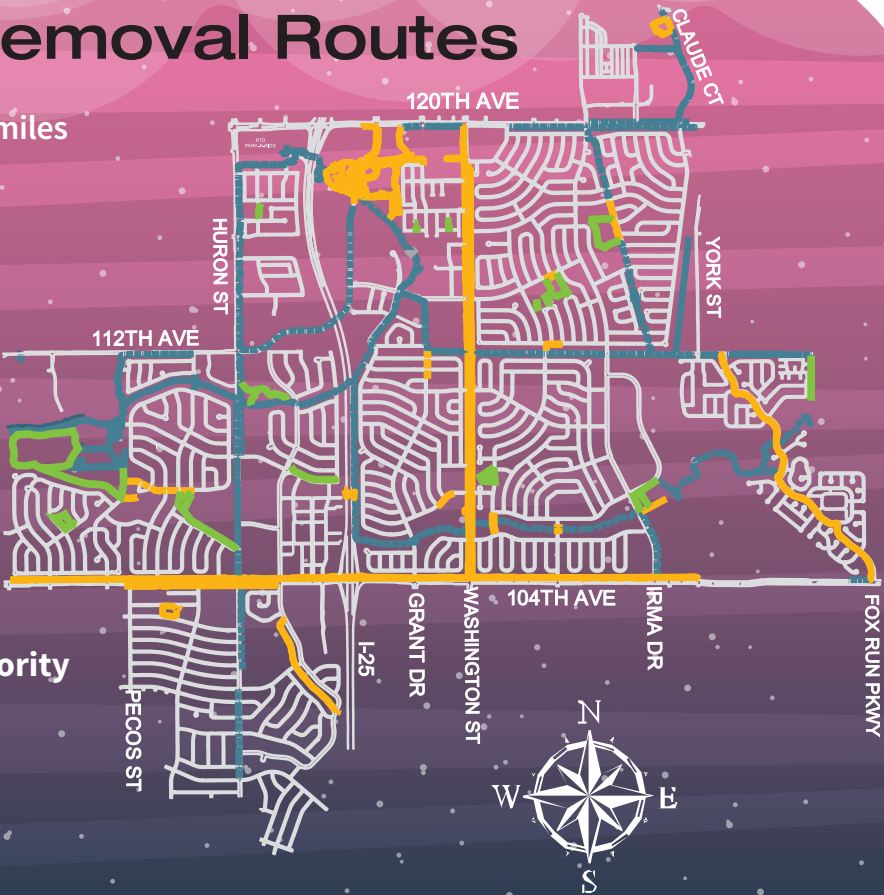
The city aims to have all paths cleared 24 hours after the snow has ended, but weather can cause delays. Patience with our snow removal efforts is appreciated.

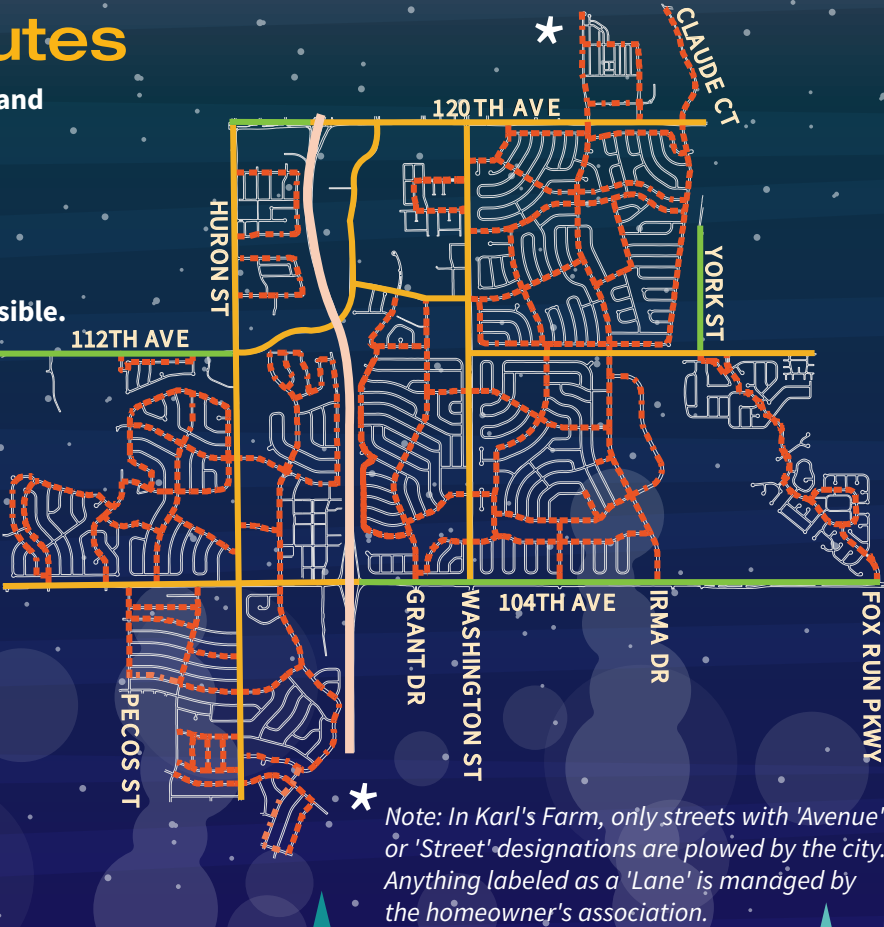


Street Snow Removal Routes

In cases of minor snowfalls (less than 4 inches) the city will plow, sand and salt primary and secondary routes as well as hazardous stops, hills, schools and emergency facilities.

For storms greater than 4 inches or if there’s the possibility of road closures, the focus will stay on primary and emergency facilities. Secondary and residential streets will be addressed as soon as possible.

- Primary Routes:** All arterials and major collector streets that serve high-traffic routes and access to emergency service vehicles • *Examples: 104th Avenue, 120th Avenue, Huron Street and Washington Street*
- Secondary Routes:** Collector streets and select residential streets that provide access to emergency stations, schools and bus routes • *Examples: Irma Drive, 112th Avenue and Community Center Drive*
- Residential Areas:** Priority is given to stretches that have dangerous hills, curves or intersections..

There's a reason why construction timelines include the caveat "weather permitting." On Sept. 14, a downpour forced the replacement of a large portion of the recently-placed foundation of the new City Hall. Thankfully, crews focused on other areas of the project, and construction is still on track to be substantially complete by Q3 2024. October saw the completion of the foundation, along with the installation of structural steel and wood framing. When it opens, this 32,600-square-foot facility will be Net Zero and have a CORE Green Building Rating – the first municipal building in Colorado to achieve that certification. The \$33.8M building is being funded completely through reserves and will be located next to the current City Hall.

City Seeking Grant for Cleanup of Old Recreation Center Site

The city is applying for EPA Brownfields Cleanup Grant funding for the former Northglenn Recreation Center site as soils considered contaminated by today's standards must be addressed.

The city received approval for a voluntary cleanup plan from the Colorado Department of

Public Health & Environment and completed an analysis of cleanup alternatives. The cleanup will include:

- Excavation and off-site disposal of contaminated soil
- Regrading the site and placement of a warning

barrier over residual soils exceeding EPA residential screening levels

- Import and placement of four feet of clean soil cap above relocated soils
- Implementation of a restriction covenant on the property to restrict sub-grade development

Once the cleanup is done, the city will look at redevelopment opportunities for the site.

New Tech to Enforce Express Lane Weaving on Interstate 25

CDOT

On Sept. 1, the Colorado Transportation Investment Office (the government-owned business within CDOT that oversees Colorado's Express Lanes) began using new technology to enforce Express Lane weaving on C-470 in the south metro area and I-25 north of Denver.

The program encourages safe driving on CTIO's network of Express Lanes by using sophisticated roadside sensors to enforce Express Lane rules. Violators identified by this technology are being issued a civil penalty via mail based on the registered address of the vehicle's license plate. This system was rolled out earlier this summer in the I-70 Mountain Express Lane corridor

where, in the first three weeks, 4,719 drivers were cited for unsafe driving. On the C-470 and I-25 Express Lane corridors, the same technology is being used to identify vehicles that are weaving in and out of the Express Lanes over the solid white lines, an action that endangers themselves and other motorists.

Enforcement began Sept. 1 with a month-long grace period. During the grace period, 42,589 drivers received warnings in the mail when they were recorded committing a violation. As of Oct. 1, violators are now being issued civil penalties starting at \$75 if paid within 20 days. After 20 days, the fine increases to \$150. ► Learn more at <https://expresslanes.codot.gov>.

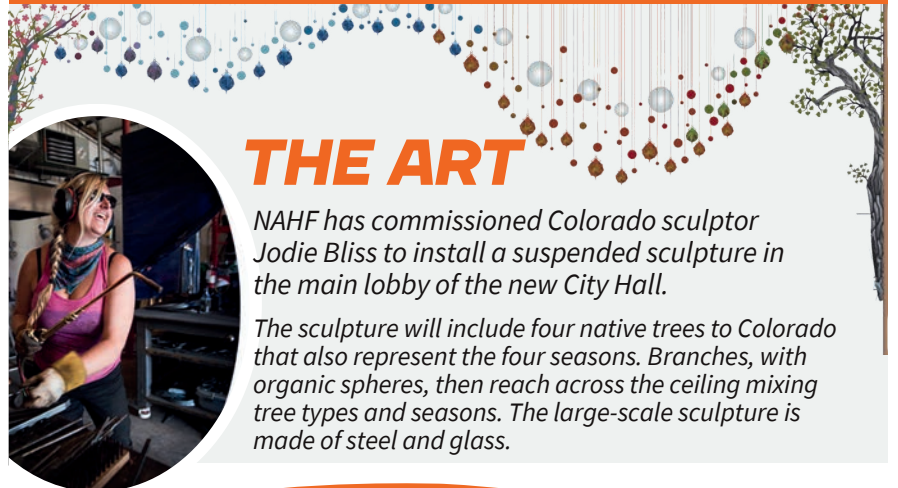

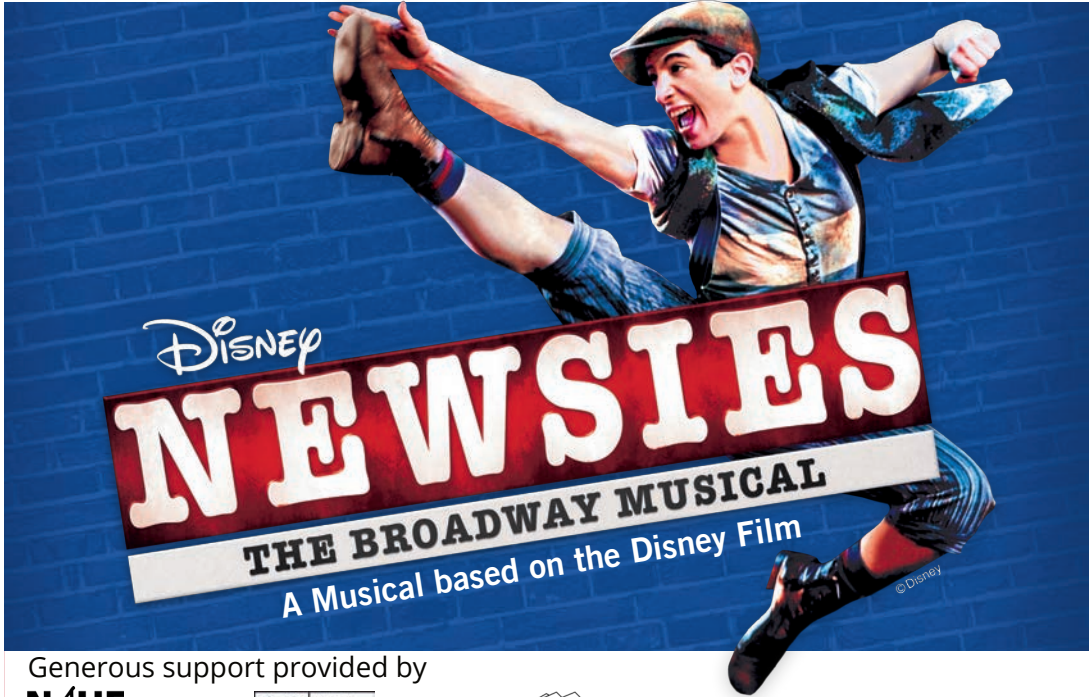
