One resiIn addition to widening the section of 120th between Sylvia Drive and the N Line overpass to three lanes to eliminate a bottleneck, the project includes improved drainage, lighting, and pedestrian paths. The city not only leveraged local, state and federal funds, the Karl's Farm developer contributed as well. Communication about project status to address reported issues has been constant. Weather has affected the construction schedule, but extended work hours have helped keep things on track. In fact, the project is scheduled to be finished by November!

Park Improvements

The summer weather has delayed two large park projects this year – **Croke Reservoir improvements and tennis and pickleball courts at Wyco and Danahy Parks.** We are pleased they are back on track, and the courts are now open for use at Wyco and are nearly complete at Danahy Park, with bocce ball to follow. The Sensory Playground at E.B. Rains Jr. Memorial Park re-opened on Memorial Day weekend, as scheduled. New poured-in-place safety surfacing, updated play features and new benches have refreshed this well-loved and well-used community gathering space.

Jaycee Ballfield now has all-new LED lights for softball leagues. This is the only lighted ballfield in Northglenn, allowing for summer evening games. The electrical system was original to the facility and has been completely modernized. Thanks to a Charge Ahead Colorado grant, an electric vehicle charging station will be installed at Jaycee for ballfield and dog park users by the end of the year. Future improvements include upgrades to the restrooms and scorekeeper booth.

120th Avenue

The need to expand capacity and improve traffic flows on 120th Avenue was identified several years ago. Work began in late December and as we move into fall we are in the home stretch on this major roadway improvement. Croke Reservoir will soon have a new fishing platform for easier access to the water's edge, fencing to remind visitors to stay out of wetland areas, interpretive signage and a refinished railing. These projects came out of recommendations from a neighborhood committee, and we are excited to see their ideas put into action! All four of these projects were possible due to generous grant funding from Adams County Open Space.

Easements and Rights-of-Way

In addition to city projects, companies like Xcel, Comcast, and T-Mobile Fiber are also working on infrastructure improvements. Sometimes access is from private property or

Local Legislative Recap: July 2023

Here is a recap of recent votes, a glance into the most discussed topics and a look ahead for City Council. Council votes on two types of items: An ordinance (CB) is an enforceable law or regulation that requires two majority votes by council to pass; a resolution (CR) is a decision, opinion, policy or directive and only requires one majority vote to pass.





what is perceived as private property. The city requires private companies to remediate impacts from work, however, they have a right to access their infrastructure to make improvements and sometimes that feels invasive.

Most companies try to communicate upcoming work and coordinate with residents. All are required to have permits and follow regulations. If you have issues, please contact the company. If you don't receive an adequate response, the city may be able to reach out on your behalf.

Many more projects are happening in our community; hopefully these examples give you an idea of the efforts the city is making to bring quality amenities and services to residents. Water, sewer, electricity, gas, internet, parks, and roads are critical to our quality of life.

If you have an issue or concern about a city project or easement/ right-of-way activity, make a report using www.northglenn.org/ AccessNorthglenn or the Access Northglenn app on your smart phone. Concerns are routed to the appropriate staff and tracked to ensure a

prompt response.

Report an Issue

Our infrastructure is aging, which means big projects and investments will continue. City Council will continue their work on finding solutions to challenges around safety concerns at the Washington Point Shopping Center and the skatepark at E.B. Rains Jr. Memorial Park. Updates will be provided in future editions of the Connection.

GOVERNMENT FOUNDATIONS



The footprint for the new City Hall has taken root. After installing utilities and caissons in July, crews moved onto foundation walls and crawl spaces in August. This foundation work will continue into September.

When it opens in the fall of 2024, this 32,600-square-foot facility will be Net Zero and have a CORE Green Building rating - the first municipal building in Colorado to achieve that certification. 

- Knowing every student by name, strength and need.



Additionally, we're making a number of investments for the 2023-2024 school year in support of these three priorities.

World Class Staff

As one of the focus areas in the district's strategic plan, World Class Staff includes the following priority: "We will improve our competitive market position for recruiting and retaining high-quality staff."

To remain competitive and address significant inflationary pressures, Adams 12 Five Star Schools has addressed a number of compensation matters. The district raised starting teacher salaries to \$58,000 a year, an increase of more than \$12,000 from the previous starting salary. The compensation package for the 2023-2024 school year also ensures that all educators

a 6 percent total increase in pay, and administrators will receive 6 percent.

Expansion of Career and Technical **Education (CTE)** Programming

The district will make additional investments in CTE programming, which is called FutureForward in Adams 12 Five Star Schools.

In response to student demand, the district will increase the number of classes offered in the following areas:

- Sports medicine
- Crime scene investigation
- Diesel
- Firefighting
- Behavioral & mental health
- Law enforcement

Additionally, given student interest, the district is adding a new program, veterinarian assistant, to FutureForward in 2023-2024.

Safe Schools

At the beginning of 2023, the Five Star District made a commitment to invest in two additional school security liaisons. The district Safety and Security team now has three school security liaisons.

These safety and security team members work directly with school administrators, district security staff and our local law enforcement partners, including school resource officers, to ensure a safe and secure learning environment at all schools.

School Security Liaisons are required to have had or currently maintain a POST (Peace Officer Standards and Training) certification, or similar certification necessary for firearms proficiency.




