

As you probably know, Northglenn has begun the process of evaluating the community's interest for a new recreation center, senior center and theater, something you told us you wanted during the Civic Center Master Plan discussions last year.



NHS P-TECH Students Earn Associate Degree

A group of students at Northglenn High School are one year closer to earning not only their high school diploma but also an associate degree in computer information systems - and all at no charge thanks to a new program.

This summer, 31 new students joined 32 returning students from the previous year who are part of Northglenn's P-TECH campus, EC@N-STEM (short for Early College at Northglenn STEM).

Pathways in Technology Early College High School, or P-TECH, programs bring together high schools, colleges and businesses to create a unique learning environ-

ment geared toward real-world experience to prepare students for in-demand jobs. Gov. John Hickenlooper signed off on P-TECH in 2015 and Adams 12 Five Star Schools was one of three districts - and the only district in the Denver metro area - to announce a P-TECH campus in 2016.

P-TECH gives students options, said Kerry Glenn, district P-TECH-STEM coordina-

"We want to provide opportunities for students to be immediately employable in STEM-related fields right out of the program, as well as have opportunities for them to earn bachelor's and master's degrees, if that is a direction they choose to pursue," Glenn said.

Through this partnership, Northglenn High School is an accredited location through Front Range Community College.






August 2017 General Fund Financial Report Figures are through the end of August

Crackdown on HOV

Violators: In response to feedback from customers and local governments along the corridor, there will be increased safety enforcement along the US 36 and I-25 Express Lanes. Since July, nearly 900 traffic violations for HOV violations and reckless driving have been committed, such as crossing solid lines, weaving in and out of the Express Lanes and other violations. An HOV violation comes with up to a \$250 fine, and weaving in and out of the Express Lanes or crossing the solid lines can yield up to a \$1,000 fine and points off a driver's license. When you drive along these corridors - be aware that enforcement is on!

Wastewater Treatment Plant Enhancements

Prolongs Life of Needed Facility

The city's Wastewater Treatment Plant is nine miles away in Weld County.

This means that wastewater, or water that is used for any purpose such as bathing, laundry or flushing, is pumped nine miles before it can be treated and returned to the earth.

The process from your home or business to the treatment plant is complicated and includes a series of pumps and lift stations before it reaches the plant for treatment and disinfection. This complex system requires periodic upgrades to treat wastewater in accordance with federal standards.

Extensive work is currently in process at the Wastewater Treatment Plant, an aging facility. In 2017, \$13 million was spent on construction at the plant, and \$29-\$32 million will be invested from 2019-21.

This construction is essential if we are to continue to provide residents with reliable wastewater service.

Public Works Director David Willett describes it this way: "Northglenn will continue to offer the best wastewater service at the lowest possible cost. Construction at the Wastewater Treatment Plant is planned over the next 10 years. We plan ahead and know what we need. Current construction will help to assure a fully functioning wastewater system for many years."



FACT OR FICTION?


The Water Treatment Facility, located on 112th Avenue, treats and pumps out approximately three million gallons of water each day in the winter and up to 10 million gallons in the summer to meet the needs of customers.

Street Snow Removal Routes

The city first clears snow from roads that receive the most traffic before moving on to other streets. If a major storm is in the forecast, the city will pretreat major streets, overpasses, hills and intersections to prevent ice build up.

- First Priority: Main streets. All lanes are plowed in each direction. Examples are 104th Avenue, 120th Avenue, Huron Street and Washington Street.
- Second Priority: School zones and streets motorists typically use to reach main streets. Examples are Claude Court, Fox Run Parkway and Pecos Street. One lane is plowed in each direction.
- Third Priority: Residential streets that connect with first priority or second priority roads. One lane is plowed in each direction.
 - Fourth Priority: Residential streets with the lightest traffic. They are plowed only if snow levels reach 8 inches, and then a single lane will be plowed down the middle of the street.



RECYCLE YOUR GREEN WASTE

Trash cart space is precious. Don't use it up with grass clippings, leaves and tree branches.

Take them to the city's Yard Waste Mulching Center in the city's Maintenance & Operations Facility, 12301 Claude Court. Please bring proof of residency, as only Northglenn residents can drop off debris. Most yard waste is accepted - except dirt, sod and gravel.

We take the yard waste and churn it into mulch that anyone - resident, non-resident and business - can have. Bring your own shovels, as the city does not provide tools to use. City staff can help load the mulch into trailers and pickups if a liability waiver is signed.

You can stop by the center every Friday year-round, 11 a.m.-2 p.m. Through November, it's also open every Saturday, 8 a.m.-3 p.m.

FIREHOUSE REMODEL

The renovation to North Metro Fire Rescue District Station 63, at 10941 Irma Drive in Northglenn, is on schedule. Firefighters are expected to move into their new quarters in December. The walls of the enlarged apparatus bay that will house the fire engine and ambulance are in and the second floor foundation has been poured. (Yes, the station will have a pole for the firefighters to slide down). Station 63 is the busiest in the district, responding to more than 2,800 calls last year.

WATER RESTRICTIONS AND CAR WASHING

A question came up, "Can I still wash my car in my driveway?" Yes, of course you can.

But with water restrictions still in place we do ask that residents follow these guidelines: please don't let excessive amounts of water leave your property and run down the gutter; wash your vehicle with a bucket and a hose with a shut-off nozzle; in addition, please don't wash hard surfaces like siding, sidewalks and driveways with a hose, use a broom instead.

Water conservation is everyone's responsibility.

NEW SCULPTURES COMING TO PROMENADE








