A Message from Mayor Leighty and City Manager Geyer

Our Voices Heard

No Sex Offenders at Mental Health Home on Grant

Recently, over 400 residents (in person) and thousands (via livestream) attended the community meeting regarding the State of Colorado Mental Health Transitional Living (MHTL) Home at 11255 and 11275 Grant Drive.

We want to thank you for attending the meeting and emailing council and city staff with your concerns.

We also want to honor those of you who shared your personal stories, and we recognize that speaking up took courage. Collectively, Northglenn came together and fought for what's best for our community. Your voices MATTER! You made a difference.

On April 12, the State Office of Civic and Forensic Mental Health committed to not housing sex offenders at the facility. They also committed to not housing sex offenders at any other facility for a two-year period. From the beginning, we believed that the state did not have a fully developed program. We recognize that some residents are disappointed that the state

will move forward with the facility, but we cannot stop them. HB22-1303 established the need for the state to create 125 mental health beds in Colorado, which created this issue of statewide concern. This means that the state does not have to follow our local land use regulations beyond basic life safety requirements for building codes.

The city also requested the state address two specific concerns — removing the lattice on the front patio and working with adjacent residents to build a taller fence on the rear of the property. They agreed.

In response to community concerns, on April 8 City Council unanimously passed an emergency ordinance to increase the distance requirement for sex offenders from 750 feet to 1,000 feet from schools. The state made an internal policy change that follows this new ordinance. At that meeting, council also passed Resolution No. 24-92, officially opposing the placement of the MHTL Home and housing sex offenders at that location.

With this compromise, a late bill in the State Legislature was taken off the table. The city will continue working with state leadership, surrounding communities, and the Colorado Municipal League to pursue steps to ensure the state's commitments are permanent.

Responses to questions asked at the community meeting will be available online as soon as answers are received. At the time of publication, the state did not have a move-in date; they agreed to share that information with the city before opening.

Moving forward, the city plans to hold the state accountable for its commitments to us.

Again, thank you to all who made their voice heard on this issue. It made a difference. Together we facilitated change. We encourage you to reach out to council and staff with questions and concerns.

Local Legislative Recap: April 2024



In March and April, construction on the new City Hall was focused on the walls, both inside and outside. Drywall installation is complete on the bottom floor and well underway on the second — with painting to follow. The mechanical system is in place throughout the building. Also, exterior wall panels were installed. In May, placement of solar panels will start and construction will begin on the south canopy. When it opens in the third quarter of 2024 next to the current City Hall, this 32,600-square-foot facility will be Net Zero and have a CORE Green Building Rating – the first municipal building in Colorado with that certification. The \$33.8M facility is being funded completely through reserves.

MENTAL HEALTH TRANSITIONAL LIVING HOME TIMELINE

- Late January: City leadership learns of plans to open the Mental Health Transitional Living (MHTL) Home in Northglenn from an email sent to the Northglenn Police Department general inbox. Chief Jim May contacted City Manager Heather Geyer, who reached out to the state the same day.
- February: City staff investigates and learns the state does not need to comply with local ordinances or the planning process. There is no legal recourse. Geyer informs City Council. The state agrees to meet with the city in late February, which led to little information for the city.
- March: The city moves forward with informing residents and businesses about the MHTL Home, including information about the intent to house sex offenders. Information is mailed in English and Spanish to 2,300 residents and businesses closest to the location, shared on city social media and in the April Connection. The city reaches out to state elected officials to investigate how to address concerns about the MHTL Home.
- April 3: Community meeting draws 400+ people (shown above). City, county and state elected officials hear the concerns for nearly three hours.
- April 8: Council unanimously passes an emergency ordinance (CB-2022) prohibiting registered sex offenders to reside less than 1,000 feet from schools. Then they pass a resolution (Resolution No. 24-92) opposing the location of the MHTL Home and the housing of sex offenders at the facility.
- April 12: The state agrees not to house sex offenders at the MHTL Home and to address other concerns.





Northglenn Arts Unveils New Long-Range Plan

Northglenn Arts, the cultural programs division for the city, has embraced its role moving forward with a new Long-Range Plan.

With the opening of the new Parsons Theatre in 2021 and in response to the changing landscape of Northglenn and the nation, Northglenn Arts saw this as a catalyst to reimagine its future.

"As the flow of production and community demand has greatly increased, it has become time to establish a vision for the future," said Michael Stricker, Northglenn Arts Executive Producer. "A future focused on impact, infrastructure and passion for story telling; all deeply embedded in the essential, determined need to uplift all voices. All stories. All of our community."

City Launching New Texting Service May 8

Your Mobile Phone May Receive an Invite From Number Northglenn 91896

The city will begin text notifications to mobile phones on May 8 through TextMyGov.

This is intended to keep residents informed on city happenings like street closures, water line breaks, upcoming events, council meetings, and more.

Don't worry, if you receive an initial text from Northglenn 91896 and do not want the information coming to your phone, simply reply "stop." If you do not receive an initial text invitation, you may opt-in at any time.

What type of text messages would you like to receive?

- General: Receive all text notifications the city sends out, including all the categories below. Text "Northglenn" to 91896.
- Utilities: For notifications like road closures, water line breaks, construction projects, and trash services, text "Northglenn Utilities" to 91896.
- City Council: For a heads up on council meetings,

public hearings, and local government issues, text "Northglenn Council" to 91896.

- Arts & Culture: Want to know about upcoming shows, auditions, exhibits, new public art and more? Text "Northglenn Arts" to 91896.
- Recreation: Registration dates, program specials, closures and tourneys will be sent to those who text "Northglenn Rec" to 91896.
- Events: Are you a fan of Food Truck Carnival, Pirate Fest, Dancing Through the Decades, and Summer Concerts/Movies? Text "Northglenn Events" to 91896 for reminders.

Again, whether you get the initial invite or opt-in to a specific list, you may text "stop" to opt-out at any time.





National Public Works Week, sponsored by the American Public Works Association, takes place the third week of every May to recognize the large impact public works employees have on the community.

13 SERVICE AREAS OF THE CITY'S PUBLIC WORKS DEPARTMENT:

- Collection & Distribution: Responsible for maintaining 182 miles of drinking water lines and 138 miles of sanitary • Streets: Maintains and clears sewer lines
- Engineering: Oversees the majority of capital improvement programs, contracting, and right-of-way permitting
- Fleet: Responsible for Northglenn's fleet of vehicles including trash trucks, snow plows, police vehicles, etc.
- Industrial Pretreatment & **Cross-Connection Control:** Protects the city's drinking water and wastewater systems from contaminations
- Lab Services: Analyzes the city's water - raw, drinking, and waste
- Maintenance: Maintains and repairs all municipal facilities, including buildings and parks

- Sanitation: Provides all residential trash and recycling services
- snow for 106 center lane miles of roadways
- Stormwater: Oversees the city's stormwater permit and focuses on reducing the discharge of pollutants into the 25 miles of stormwater
- Water Quality: Monitors and ensures compliance with federal and state laws, rules, and regulations
- Water Resources: Focuses on water rights and conservation programs
- Wastewater Treatment: Cleans the city's wastewater so it can be returned to the environment
- Water Treatment: Ensures that the water the community uses is safe

STREET SWEEPING MAP

The map shows areas labeled 1-7. Each area requires two days to complete. Your address determines your sweeping day.

If your address ends in 1, 3, 5, 7 or 9, you are on the odd schedule. If the number of your address ends with 0, 2, 4, 6 or 8, you are on the even schedule.

· The first date is the odd-numbered side of the street

 The second date is the even-numbered side of the street.

You must keep the sweeping side of the street clear from 7 a.m. to 4 p.m. for both days of the cycle. You may still drive on the street, but not park.

This process will continue throughout the schedule.

Street Sweeping in May

Street sweeping may seem odd – why are we cleaning the roads? In actuality, it makes our community healthier by keeping dirt and other particulates out of our air and waterways.

The city strives to sweep all streets twice a year; this spring's cleaning runs May 7 through 31.

Although the powerful vacuums on our sweepers can pick up a lot, they're powerless against cars and trash carts. If something is in the way, the city will NOT sweep that section.

Please look at the map above and make sure any of your household's large items are off the street on your scheduled day. As a reminder, signs will be put up the Monday before an area is swept.

In case sweeping needs to be canceled for a day, the scheduled area will be moved to the end of the month and a new schedule will be posted at www. northglenn.org/streetsweeping.

Free landfill day rules:

- Only one load per residence
- All loads must be covered.
- Proof of residency such as a driver's license or a

current utility bill with picture ID is required.

- Appliances, including those with freon, will be accepted for free.
- Mattresses and box springs cost \$36 each to drop off.
- People bringing a pickup truck or trailer face a gate charge plus taxes and fees if they have more than five cubic yards of materials.
- A safety vest must be worn when unloading; they are provided at the landfill entrance.

The following items are NOT accepted:

- Electronics
- Hazardous materials
- Used oil
- Medical waste
- Ammunition Fireworks
- Fluorescent light


