General Park Rules and Regulations

- Park hours are 5 a.m. to 11 p.m. daily.
- Alcoholic beverages are prohibited.
- Glass containers are prohibited.
- No dogs or horses permitted.
- No littering.
- Foot traffic and wheelchairs only.
- No swimming, wading, tubing, boating, ice skating or walking on ice permitted.
- No bicycles.

Fishing Rules and Regulations

Please abide by all Colorado Department of Wildlife rules and regulations for fishing.

Here are some additional rules and restrictions to fishing on Croke Reservoir:

- Fishing is permitted from April to October.
- Boats and/or floatation devices are prohibited.
- Fishing is permitted with flies and lures only.
- Fishing is prohibited on the north shore.

The Croke Reservoir Nature Area is a home and resting place for more than 40 species of wildlife. This is their habitat, which they share with us. Please treat it with respect.


To encourage the continued use of this area for nesting and feeding, please observe the wildlife from a distance and stay on the trail.

Before you depart from Croke, clean up the area you visited and leave nothing but foot-prints.

Located off of Huron Street just north of Naiad Drive, Croke Reservoir went through a \$3.3 million renovation in 2007 and 2008, resulting in a rebuilt eastern shoreline and a better habitat for fish in the reservoir.










